National Awareness & Events – Human Rights Week at Harlington: *Learning, Leading & Living Our Values...*

This week, Harlington School came alive with powerful conversations, inspiring stories and big ideas as we celebrated Human Rights Week across form time and assemblies. From global perspectives to everyday school life, our students explored what it truly means to respect, protect and champion the rights of others.

We kicked off the week by diving into the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, discovering how these 30 articles shape the world we live in. Students explored real stories of courage — including the inspiring journey of Malala Yousafzai, whose determination for education and equality continues to motivate young people around the world. Throughout the week, **members of our School Council** led whole-school announcements, shining a spotlight on everyday human rights and reminding us how our words, choices and actions can make a huge difference. On Human Rights Day, we were honoured to have Ms. Pearce-Kelly address our school community with a powerful message about kindness, responsibility, and our shared humanity. We also looked at the incredible work of organisations like the Red Cross and Amnesty International, linking their global missions to our own school values of Aspiration, Community and Diversity. Together, we explored how each of us can “**live out** **these values with kindness** - in our classrooms, corridors, and friendships.

To deepen the learning, students were invited to take part in an activity: “*Think of one right that matters to you... and one behaviour you can use to protect it.*” From the right to education, to the right to be safe, our students reflected thoughtfully on how small positive actions can uphold big principles. Human Rights Week has reminded us that kindness and respect isn’t just a rule - it’s a responsibility. At Harlington, our young people are proving every day that they are ready to lead with courage and kindness.

I am pleased to share an outstanding end-of-term update regarding our Year 8 Computer Science cohort. This term has seen remarkable engagement, consistency, and achievement across the group, with notable highlights demonstrated by four students in particular: **Abdi, Prabhi, Faizan, and Eva.**

Over the past several weeks, these students have successfully developed and tested three fully functioning Python programs entirely from scratch:


- A **speed converter**, where the user inputs distance and time, and the program calculates the resulting speed
- A **temperature converter**, converting Celsius to Fahrenheit using correct computational logic
- A **grade-book system**, using user input to determine grades based on programmed criteria

Their ability to apply programming structures, handle variables, perform arithmetic operations, and generate accurate outputs represents a significant step forward in computational thinking and problem-solving at KS3 level.

In addition to their technical development, the class has maintained an excellent **99% homework completion rate**, demonstrating consistent effort and independence throughout the term. I am also pleased to confirm that we have successfully completed **two full units of work**, meeting and exceeding curriculum expectations.

When you see these students around the school, I kindly ask that you congratulate them on their

exceptional progress and professional attitude—they have truly earned it.
